Report from the Sergeant-At-Arms

The year is off to a great start here at the Dutch House. I don't think the house has ever had better curb appeal than it has after this summer. Over the past few years, the ivy has come down, the big bushes have come out, and this summer the alumni who volunteered on Alumni Workday in June planted dozens of hostas to replace the bushes on the west side of the house. With our recent removal of the Buckeye tree in the western portion of the front yard, the house has a much cleaner look.

Over the summer, numerous improvements were made, the most notable of which is our new laundry room. After many days of painting, plumbing, and electrical work the new facilities are ready to go, and our two new sets of Maytag commercial washers and dryers are ready to meet the laundering needs of 30 college guys. Work has also been done to convert the bike room (known as the "Dent Lab" to some older alumni) into a workshop, and some water damage was repaired in the guest bathroom. Many individual rooms were updated by their tenants over the summer, including rooms 203, 211, 305, 306, 308, and 309, which received attention ranging from a simple coat of paint to plaster and flooring repair.

Our plans for the near future include repainting the great room, trimming tree limbs, and repairing several crumbling concrete steps and driveway sections. Overall, the house has improved significantly in my first year in office so far, and I look forward to seeing the trend continue.


Tyler Bowden by Lee Overbeck






